Thirty Days to Slow the Spread

I encourage all South Carolinians to follow the below guideline on slowing the spread of the coronavirus.

THE PRESIDENT'S CORONAVIRUS GUIDELINES FOR AMERICA

30 DAYS TO SLOW THE SPREAD

Listen to and follow the directions of your STATE AND LOCAL AUTHORITIES.

IF YOU FEEL SICK, stay home. Do not go to work. Contact your medical provider.

IF YOUR CHILDREN ARE SICK, keep them at home. Do not send them to school. Contact your medical provider.

IF SOMEONE IN YOUR HOUSEHOLD HAS TESTED POSITIVE for the coronavirus, keep the entire household at home. Do not go to work. Do not go to school. Contact your medical provider.

IF YOU ARE AN OLDER PERSON, stay home and away from other people.

IF YOU ARE A PERSON WITH A SERIOUS UNDERLYING HEALTH CONDITION that can put you at increased risk (for example, a condition that impairs your lung or heart function or weakens your immune system), stay home and away from other people.



Paycheck Protection Program

Small businesses and sole proprietorships are able to begin their applications for Paycheck Protection Program loans **NOW**. These loans were a part of the CARES Act passed by Congress and signed into law by President Donald Trump last week. The Paycheck Protection Program provides eight weeks of cash-flow assistance to small businesses who maintain their payroll during this emergency.
